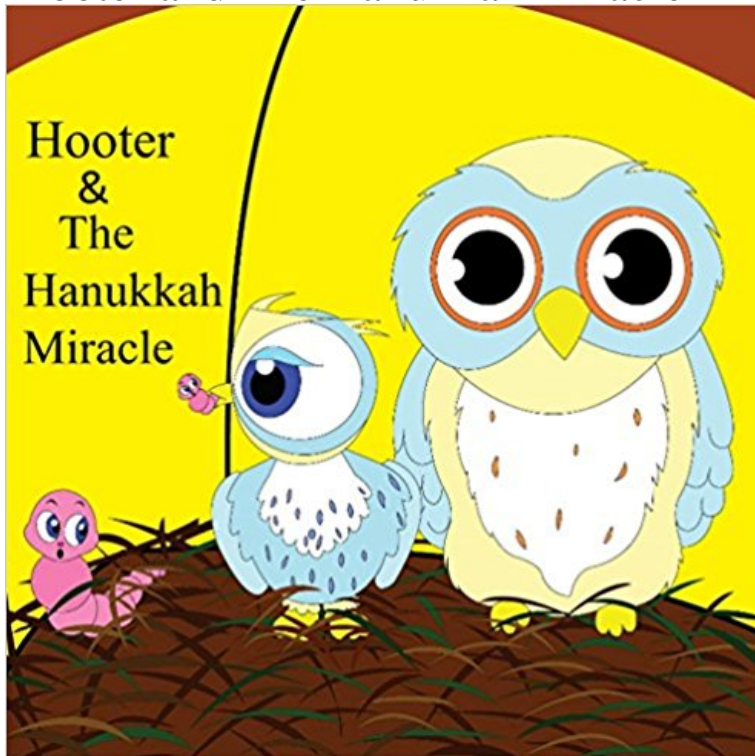


Hooter and The Hanukkah Miracle
